

- The average life expectancy in the U.S. was 47 years.

- Coffee was fifteen cents a pound.

- The five leading causes of death in the U.S. were:
 - 1. Pneumonia and influenza
 - 2. Tuberculosis
 - 3. Diarrhea
 - 4. Heart disease
 - Stroke
- The American flag had 45 stars. (Arizona, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Hawaii, and Alaska hadn't been admitted to the Union yet.)
- The population of Las Vegas, Nevada, was 30!!!
- Crossword puzzles, canned beer, and iced tea hadn't been invented.
